Reduce Impaired Driving Through Enforcement and Education: During the month of December Kings District saw an increase in traffic enforcement presence in partnership with the Provincial Priority Unit. Kings District in total saw 40 HTA tickets issued and 26 general warnings. We also participated in winter holiday road checks. Additional efforts resulted in 6 investigations of impaired driving ending in 4 charges and 3 more charges of driving while disqualified.

Enhancing Police Operations/Open Communication: Kings District RCMP remain involved in the schools, December saw a lot of time in Montague Regional Highschool and we even brought our service puppy for a visit as well as to the hospital. We completed an internet safety/cyber bullying presentation to Southern Kings Consolidated and 100 students in total. We engaged in other additional visible events that included community a Toys for Tots hockey game, Holiday parades, safe holiday messaging in partnership with IEMS and Fire, food bank donations and 150 community patrols and in doing so completed 25 overall acts of Generosity, Inclusion, Volunteering, Effort and Support all in the spirit of the end of our 150th anniversary. We also donated gym equipment to Harbourview Training Center and had the pleasure also of hosting a visit from Commissioner Mike Duheme in Montague where he was able to relive memories from his posting here when it was Montague Detachment. We participated in an invite to the Emergency Protection Order update planning committee. We also saw online training for the Detachment to assist us in taking a more Trauma Informed Approach, training that is also mandatory for all frontline and operational members. We also saw the arrival of a new police support puppy who is living in Souris and is being trained by Corporal Ian Allen. There is a name the puppy event happening presently to help us name her, any name that starts with an "L". We have operational skills training for several members in January and February and we are seeing our more senior members trying to find time to prepare for our annual promotional exam.

Finally, after a traumatic missing person turned Homicide in Kings, serious hard work and cooperation resulted in the victim being located and the arrest of two youth offenders for serious indictable offences, including Murder, Indignity to Human Remains and Obstruction.

Media Relations/PSA's: We reconfigured our intelligence collection process and have partnered with other units to ensure the right information is shared to the right authorities in the right manner and we also made use of the media to locate a long term wanted individual hiding in Kings County. We also made heavy use of news media in the aforementioned Major crime which also saw the use of significant police resources, specialized units and equipment in the Southern Kings area.

Human Resources: We currently have 20 of 24 members in place. Of the 4 vacancies, 3 are off for medical reasons and the fourth, the Sergeant has been officially transferred to Headquarters. A replacement has already been identified for the Ops NCO position and they will be returning home to the Island from Nova Scotia, likely near the summer. Our external police officer Constable Andrew Nicholson has completed his conversion training in Regina and will begin his first operational shift on January 10 and we still expect an external police officer from Hamilton Police and a new member from Depot to be on the ground in February or March and we are awaiting Constable Joel Talbot, a lateral transfer arriving from the Yukon sometime near April. We are sad to see Constable Matthew Paynter transfer to Queens Detachment February 1 but wish him the best of luck in his new post.
